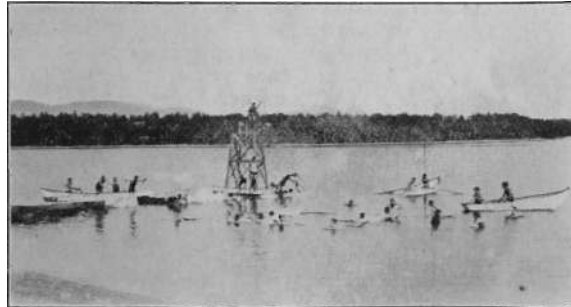

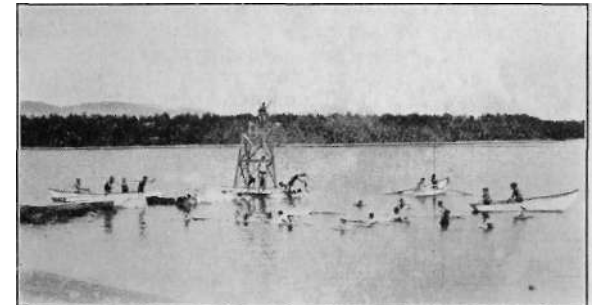

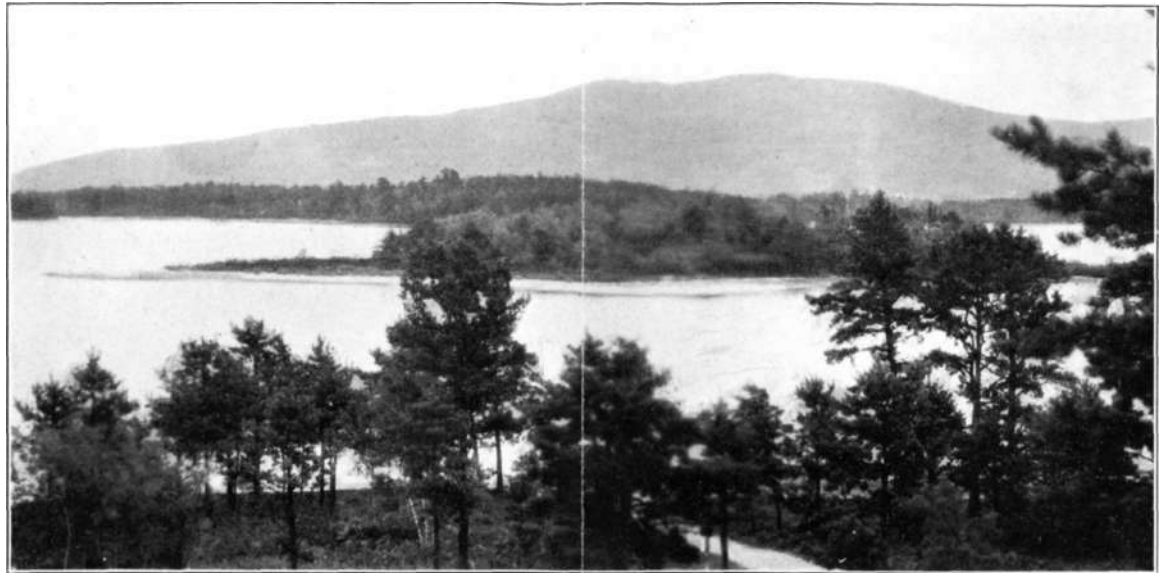
The Swimming Beach

CAMP HUCKINS is open to any boy or girl of good moral character, nine to sixteen years of age, who will agree to abide by the rules of the camp. No camper is accepted for less than two weeks, but may remain for the entire month.

THE PURPOSE OF CAMP HUCKINS is to develop strong Christian character with leadership as the objective towards which all of its programs are planned. Training in citizenship for community life and team work, with the cultivation of self-reliance, which enables service to others, is incorporated in the every-day routine.

THE HUCKONIAN HONOR AGREEMENT

Suggestions only are necessary where all the campers are on their honor to uphold high standards of conduct and friendship. For the sake of the other campers it is agreed that tobacco and explosives are undesirable and that swimming and boating be carried on only at prescribed times and under supervision.

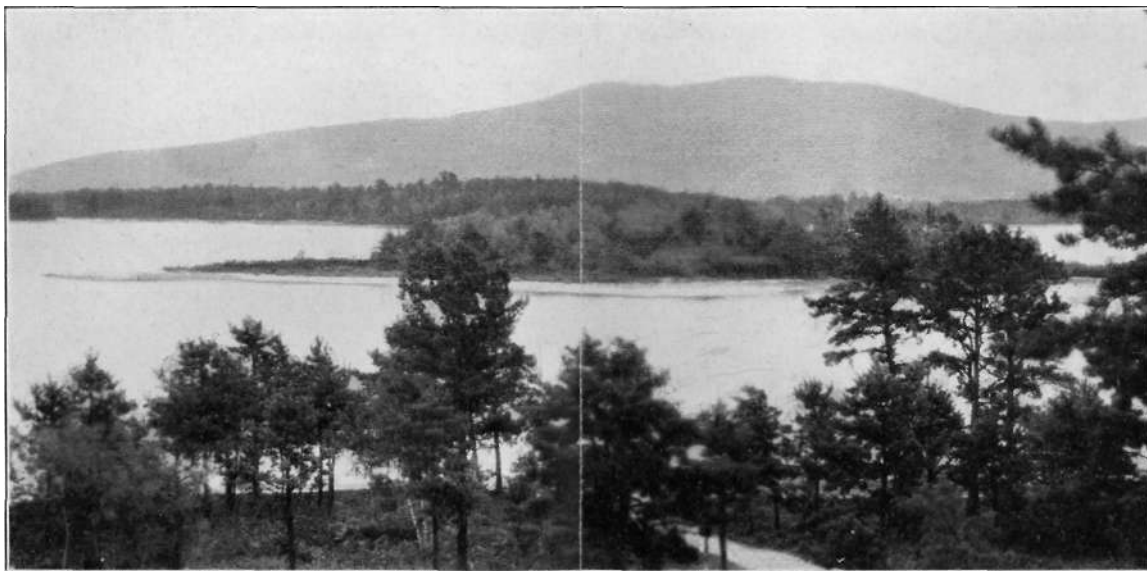
SITE OF CAMP HUCKINS

EQUIPMENT — The lodge and dining hall, which is forty-two by sixty-five feet, with large piazza all screened, is beautifully located on a high point of ground overlooking Ossipee Bays and to the north can be seen Chocorua and other peaks of the White Mountains. The eight cabins have double cots and shutters and are screened. The director's cottage serves as the camp office. The camp is equipped with a flush toilet system and every building is lighted with electricity. There are six safe row boats, an out-board motor, floating wharfs, diving tower and spring boards. The water supply is pure and cold all summer. The camp site of thirty-five acres, including Loon Island of two acres, is the gift of Mr. S. O. Huckins of Center Ossipee.
